Defensively, Melton led the Cats with six rebounds and two steals, followed by Sowle with four rebounds, one block, and three steals, and Daniels with two rebounds and six steals. Griffiths had one rebound and three steals, and Lundvall and Messersmith each had one rebound and one steal.
