Leading the team offensively against the Raiders was Morgan Messersmith with 13 points (four aces), followed by Christine Daniels (two aces) and Mickayla Sheets (one ace) each with eight points.

Sarah Hubbard had five points (one ace), Lundvall had four points, and Maggie May had two points.

Leading the team with set assists were Alexandria Lundvall with 30, and Sheets with one. Defensively, Daniels led the team with 14 kills and one block, followed by Hayley Storm with eight kills. Mackenzie Aylward had three kills and two blocks, Hubbard had three kills, Sheets had two kills, and senior Jaclyn Nelson had one kill and one block.

Wallace vs. Potter-Dix

The Wallace Wildcats competed in the Potter-Dix Triangular in Potter on Monday, Oct. 14. The Cats' first opponent was the Coyotes of Potter-Dix. The Wildcats started the match a bit flat. The eerie quiet of the gym, and the low ceiling seemed to mess with the Cats 'timing. The

Wildcats dropped the first set, but really seemed to wake up and rally. The Lady Cats defeated the Coyotes 16-25, 25-19 and 25-15.

Leading the team offensively against the Coyotes was junior Morgan Messersmith with 12 points (two aces), followed by junior Mickayla Sheets with seven points (one ace). Senior Alexandria Lundvall had (three aces) five points, senior Sara Hubbard had (one ace) four points, junior Christina Daniels had three points, and freshman Maggie May had two points. Leading the team with set assists were senior Lundvall with 15, and Sheets with one. Defensively, junior Hayley Storm led the team with 11 kills and two blocks, followed by Daniels with six kills and three blocks. Hubbard had five kills, and Sheets had two kills.

Wallace vs. Garden Co.

The Lady Cats then had to face the Eagles of Garden County. The Eagles were ready for a tough fight, but the Lady Cats were just too tough.
