The fallen soldiers who have given their lives in pursuit of our nation's freedom will be honored with military tributes across the nation on Memorial Day, Monday May 31.

Cemeteries across the Highline have set public ceremonies so the grateful residents of our region can pay tribute to the men and women who sacrificed their lives for the love of their country.

Sites honoring the war dead in Perkins County include Venango Cemetery, Fairview Cemetery of Grant, Madrid Cemetery and Elsie Cemetery. Farther east along the Highline into Lincoln County, the Morning View Cemetery at Wallace will host Memorial Day services.

Venango Cemetery

10:30 a.m.—American Legion District 5 Commander Lee Hoatson from Sutherland will be the Memorial Day speaker.

Lunch: Following the ceremony at the cemetery, a free-will donation lunch will be served at the American Legion Hall sponsored by American Legion Auxiliary Unit 270. Everyone is welcome.

Speaker: Lee Hoatson graduated from Sutherland in 1962 and joined the U.S. Navy. He served mostly on submarines for the next six years, including time in the Vietnam war zone and in the Far East.

He was discharged in 1968 and attended college, graduating from UNL with a Bachelor's Degree in animal science.

He and wife Barb were married in 1965 and have two children, Jeff and Jodi, and three grandsons.

Hoatson was asked to join the American Legion in 1968 and has served as Post 208 Adjutant and Commander and District 5 Vice Commander and Commander.

He later served as Area D Vice Commander and Sergeant at Arms for State Commander Dave Konz.

He is a permanent member of the American Legion and VFW, a member of the 40&8 and Sons of the American Legion. He also served with the American Legion National Committee from Nebraska.

Most of all, Hoatson is a proud American veteran who loves his country.

Speaker: Pastor Carrig and his family moved to Grant in December 2005 where he pastors the

He was not always a follower of Jesus. Born and raised in New Jersey, the transition occurred three years into his education at Rutgers University.

The turning point occurred when a roommate, an avid Bible reader, encouraged him to take a New Testament course.

Speaker: Pastor Kahle has a long history of military service.

He grew up on a farm south of Kearney. He entered the Army after high school, was stationed in Fort Knox, Ky., and Fort Hood, Texas. He served in Bindlach, West Germany and was on border patrol duty the day The Wall came down.

He served in Desert Shield/Desert Storm, then returned to Germany. He switched his major to nursing when he returned home. He signed up as an Army nurse through ROTC, returned to the military and was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Army Nurse Corps.

He took an Officer Basic Course at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, and was assigned to Ireland Army Medical Hospital in Fort Knox where he made emergency room care his specialty for many years.

He made the decision to enter the ministry, and with less than a year remaining in his commitment, was sent to Korea by the Army Nurse Corps to serve in the 121st Medical Hospital in Seoul.

This was his last military station.

Upon discharge in 2000 he enrolled in Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Ind. While going to school he continued his chosen career as a nurse, working in an emergency room at the local trauma center.

Upon completion of his Masters of Divinity Degree, he was called by Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church of Imperial.

Pastor Kahle and his wife, Merinda, have been married nearly 18 years and have a 14-year-old daughter, Tapainga.
