

### **Dahlkoetter awarded for presentation**

Morningside College student Danielle Dahlkoetter, daughter of Dennis and Cynthia Dahlkoetter of Grant recently won a first-place award for her presentation at the Great Plains Students' Psychology Convention at Northwest Missouri State in Maryville, Mo.
